The South Central Iowa Solid Waste Agency (SCISWA) is an intergovernmental agency serving Lucas, Marion, Monroe, and Poweshiek Counties and the city of Victor in Iowa County. The Agency operates a Transfer Station located near Malcom in Poweshiek County where garbage is collected and then transported via transfer trailer to the Landfill in Marion County.

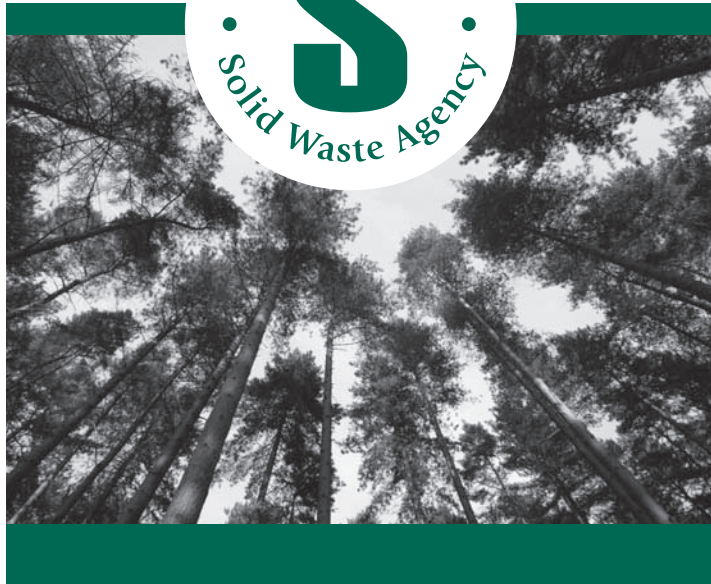

Guide to Solid Waste Services

Mission

The South Central Iowa Solid Waste Agency exists to provide for the economically and environmentally sound management of all waste materials generated within the Agency service area. It will do so through development and/or coordination of an integrated solid waste management program provided by the Agency and its public and private partners. The outcome of using this integrated approach will be to minimize the contamination and pollution of the land, water, and air resources of the area while also fostering broader commitment to proper waste management practices.

SCISWA does not accept free-flowing liquids, hazardous wastes, or asbestos. Waste is accepted from residents of the Agency counties only (Lucas, Marion, Monroe, and Poweshiek). All loads must be tarped and tied.

Cover Up

To prevent waste from falling or blowing out along the road, all loads must be covered (tarped) and secured (tied) from the time you leave your home or business until you reach the Landfill or Transfer Station.

Surcharges of \$10 for untarped private vehicles and \$100 for untarped commercial vehicles are collected. This money is used to help member counties clean litter from roadways.



Did you know ...

- Household batteries can be recycled at the Landfill, Transfer Station, or the Household Chemical collection events.
- Latex paint can be thrown in the trash if it is dried out. Mix kitty litter or sawdust in the paint to make it clump. Leave the lid off the can.
- Fluorescent light tubes and compact fluorescent bulbs (CFLs) contain mercury and shouldn't be placed with regular trash. Recycle all fluorescents at the Household Chemical collection events.
